Careers and Jobs Board

- The University of Chichester has its own unique Careers and Jobs Board for students and graduates to access information on companies and advertised positions.

Graduate jobs

• These are early career roles for recent graduates that require the applicant to have a degree and are usually not specific to a subject area.

Graduate Scheme

- A graduate scheme usually involves rotations around different departments to give the successful applicant a whole company overview.
- A range of projects and trainings are completed in order to develop into a leadership position.

Placements

- Placements are embedded in a course and are usually assessed and relevant to the student's degree, allowing them to put into practice their theoretical learning.
- They may last from a couple of weeks to 12 months.
 A 12 month placement is often referred to as a 'Year in Industry' and takes place between the second and final year of a degree.

Internships

- Internships are normally fixed term paid positions, and there are often variations on type for both undergraduates and graduates.
- They may last from 1–12 months and will incorporate specific projects, training etc.
- Sometimes badged as a 'fixed term graduate role' or a 'placement'.

Work Experience/Work Tasters

- Work experience is a short term opportunity which gives the student exposure to a particular company and the opportunity to support with tasks or a particular project.
- If unpaid, it should not involve any contractual obligations, replace a role that could be paid and should not last any longer than 20 working days.

Work Shadowing

- The student shadows employees at a company to find out more about the company and the roles of staff there. It normally lasts no more than one to two days.
- May be asked to assist with basic tasks.

Volunteering

• Unpaid opportunity with a not-for-profit or charitable organisation.

Part-time job

- Paid job involving part-time hours.
- Often lower level work but could also be a graduate job or internship.
