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
A WORD FROM OUR DIRECTOR

Don't be afraid to make a statement.


Bert says "We're all of us, in different ways, likely to be keen to be in the public eye. It's obviously important for performers to look the part whilst actually doing something dramatic and exciting, but I would argue that it's also a bit of an easy win to look dramatic and exciting when you're not actually doing anything. Anyway, Ben has asked me to demonstrate doing nothing in a dramatic and exciting way - I'm literally sitting on his fence, so I think that counts. But take a close look at the detail. I've chosen not just one shade of brown on my back but an, I think, attractive transition from light to darker shading. The shape of my coat, framed by (though I say it as oughtn't) some endearingly plump wings isn't static, it draws the eye downwards.

And when the eye reaches the bottom, my bottom, I haven't just got feathers – I've got feathers. Don't be afraid to make a statement. And remember, your beak will always lead in the silhouette, so the white flashes on my neck and head which echo it are a kind of hommage to this, I hope. Took quite a bit of time working on the wings themselves which also look good open (which you can't see in this picture). So, if you're coming to Chichester bear in mind that this is one way, perhaps one of the best ways to dress – try to look the part. And I'm standing on one leg..."

CONSERVATOIRE STUDENTS WORK ON NEW MUSICAL AHEAD OF NEW YORK RUN

In early May, Conservatoire students took part in a week-long workshop to develop a new musical which is heading to New York later this year.

The new Scottish folk musical, Lifeline, tells the story of Alexander Fleming and the discovery of penicillin, and 36 students on the BA (Hons) Musical Theatre Performance programme performed the new musical, in full, at the end of the workshopping week.

The University of Chichester Conservatoire has established a reputation as a key development facility for new musical theatre writing within the UK since Andrew Wright, Programme Leader for Musical Theatre Performance, launched initiatives to support emerging, new work.

In partnership with Mercury Musical Development and Musical Theatre Network, the students gain first-hand experience of working directly with the writers, creating original roles, having input in the process and truly understanding the myriad of challenges that face those creating new musicals.

For Lifeline, students worked in collaboration with producer Jessica Conway and the creative team at Charades Theatre Company on developing and refining the show ahead of a confirmed run in New York in the autumn.

Andrew said: "When the opportunity arose for us to work on this show, I knew I had to find a way to make it happen. This is an exciting opportunity for our students to be involved in the progression of a show that is heading to New York later this year."

Lifeline, with music and lyrics by Robin Hiley and a book by Becky Hope-Palmer, tells the story of Scottish scientist Alexander Fleming's world-changing discovery of penicillin in 1928, charting the rise and fall of antibiotics. Fleming's story weaves with Aaron's, who is receiving cancer treatment today, almost 100 years after antibiotics were discovered. But his life hangs in the balance, as he waits to see if this miracle cure still works well enough to save him.

Jessica said: "We are so delighted to have worked with the Musical Theatre Performance students at Chichester Conservatoire on Lifeline. We have been on a long journey with this musical, starting under the name of The Mould that Changed the World with two sell-out runs at the Edinburgh Fringe and a sold-out tour to the East coast of the US.

We have been working hard over the past year to develop the show ahead of our off-Broadway run this autumn and as a vital part of this development, we are worked with University of Chichester students to get the new version on its feet. They are the first ones to have shaped this new script and it was a total joy to see them bring it to life across the week. The students' and Andrew's commitment to supporting and championing new musicals is fantastic and we are very grateful to have had this experience with them."

A selection of second and third-year students performed the new musical on Friday 10th May in The Chapel of The Ascension on Bishop Otter Campus. The performance was directed by Alex Howarth, with musical direction from Neil Metcalfe. The workshop performance was facilitated and produced by Andrew Wright at the University of Chichester, working in collaboration with Jessica Conway at Charades Theatre.



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BETTY PASSES DOWN WONDERFUL UNIVERSITY MEMORIES

BMus Vocal Performance student, Imogen Barter, kindly shares with us her grandmother's experiences studying at the University of Chichester over 80 years ago.

Throughout her life, my grandmother, Betty, always had a love for dancing, singing and performing. She was a talented dancer and had been written about in local newspapers as 'Kenton's child dancer'. She excelled at ballet, tap and musical comedy and was often selected for solos. If it were not for the war that she experienced in her teens and the need for a qualification that would guarantee a paying career, it would have been likely she could have trained as a professional dancer.

In 1941, Betty began the Advanced PE course, specialising in dance, at Bishop Otter Church of England teacher training college for women. As she attended during the war, Betty and her friends had to contend with the challenges that this brought. She recounts that, as there was rationing, her first meal was a single

sardine on a dinner plate! Far from the warm welcome that freshers expect today! Students were not allowed out in the evenings as it was a barracks town. Lectures were held in the mornings and evenings, whilst in the afternoon the college was occupied by Portsmouth Training College who had been evacuated from their buildings. In 1939 it had been decided that parts of the grounds should be dug up for growing potatoes and by 194 it was reported that there was more than enough produce to supply the college's needs. Whilst much of the campus has changed since the 1940s, this is one thing that is no longer a feature.

In the summer holiday of 1942, the RAF commandeered the college as a signals headquarters ready for D-Day. As a result, Betty lived at home in Kenton for the first term of the second year and went to Uxendon Manor Primary School for teaching practice. Bishop Otter College then found new premises at Stockwell College in Bromley, Kent, as they had already been evacuated to a safer place. The college was in 'Bomb Alley' and Betty said that much of their time was spent in air raid shelters. Despite the upheaval and disruption, she faced during her training, Betty qualified with distinction in Advanced PE.

During her time teaching, Betty organised many dance displays and theatrical performances. At her first secondary school (Mill End, High Wycombe) she devised a story in dance for all age groups. At another school (Claremont School, Kenton) she devised and produced Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs. Newspapers articles commented 'The standard of dancing, to the excellent choreography of Miss Woolhead [Betty], was high' and 'Miss B. Woolhead, who devised all the dances for the show, is to be congratulated upon achieving a maximum effect from comparatively simple steps and routines'.

Arriving at Bishop Otter campus for a campus tour in September 2022, I could not help but be overwhelmed at looking to study at the same college attended by my grandmother over 60 years ago. Despite not being able to pursue a career in professional dance, Betty was able to train through the difficult times of the war, which most of us could not imagine, and bring her love of dance to all the children she taught. I feel incredibly proud of her and the work she did in dance and performance. It is a great blessing to feel connected with her every time I am on campus.

SIM PLAYERS PROJECT – MAISY WARD-JACKSON

2nd year Musical Theatre (Music) student, Maisy Ward-Jackson, has proudly been involved with the Sim Players project led by James Wilson, Senior Lecturer in Nursing.

This project is an innovative way to train healthcare workers, both those who are already within the profession and those studying. They provide interactive theatre sessions with the aim to provide healthcare education that is engaging and immersive, setting realistic examples for what may be found in a healthcare workplace.

The morning workshop included collaborating with Nursing students running through several challenges that may arise in the workplace. Ideas were gathered from attendees' own experience and students were encouraged to play a few out. Students were encouraged to reflect on what everyone in the scenario might be thinking or feeling.

Alongside her Sim Players team, Maisy has also visited hospitals around West Sussex to give training sessions to healthcare workers from a range of backgrounds on how to manage distress. They were presented with a range of options, in each circumstance, where both a healthcare worker and the person they're interacting with were under distress. They then suggested the different consequences of the choices they made throughout the piece.

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In Focus: Charlotte Xerri



An interview with
Charlotte Xerri talking with
us about her adaptable
career as a vocalist

What was your biggest influence in pursuing a career in performance and music/vocal education?

As an interpretative artist I am inspired by the work of great composers, from Hildegarde of Bingen, the Medieval powerhouse, to Anais Mitchell, composer of *Hedestown*, my favourite of the new musical theatre pieces. As a teacher, my PGCE mentor Chris Hiscox influenced my choice to embrace education alongside performance, at the time I was determined I wanted to be a performer and not a teacher!

What are your three top tips for any vocalists studying at the University of Chichester?

Eat well. Sleep well. Work hard, that's the short answer. A longer one embraces the understanding that the human instrument is at the same time, physiological and athletic, acoustic and existing in a spatial context, psychological in that it is influenced by thoughts and emotions, and an expression of the spirit and a manifestation of free will. Therefore, look after your instrument, train it incrementally towards a focused goal, be aware of the affect thoughts and emotions have on your instrument and exercise your creativity by following your instincts.

In terms of vocal health, can you briefly explain the benefits of Estill Voice Training?

Estill trains conscious, predictable control of voice quality. This enables a performer to optimise singing and speaking for efficiency. Efficient function is healthy function.

Can you tell us your most memorable moment in your career so far?

There are many wonderful memories. The first time I was paid to sing an operatic role, Second Lady, Mozart's Magic Flute, springs to mind; I had made it, and it was heaven on earth. There are some scary ones too; as a research subject at Ohio State University, USA, for a project lead by a cleft palate surgeon who was looking into the function of the muscles of the soft palate. I had to lie in an MRI scanner and hold a high tense palate position for 4 minutes without swallowing (the time it takes to scan the head). Apart from the MRI being claustrophobic there was an element of performance anxiety, it was important not to swallow so the scan could capture information about the stretched muscles. We were all under pressure because access to the MRI is very expensive and the research team had limited funding. I never imagined my career would take me into that highstakes performance situation.

Where do you see yourself in five years?

I would like to complete some of the research projects that have been brewing over the previous ten years. When I first met Jo Estill in 2003, she asked me 'who are you, why are you

interested in my work and what are you going to do?'. Twenty years ago I didn't know how to answer those questions. Now I have a clear idea of research that I would like to do. Watch this space!

What would you say is your greatest strength as a vocalist?

Adaptability, I can use my hard-earned technical skills to meet the demands of the roles presented to me, be it teacher, performer, or Lab Rat!

What musicians do you admire?

I am really excited by Japanese jazz composer and pianist Hiromi. She is so full of joy. Have a listen to her version of Gershwin's *I Got Rhythm*. I just watched Chaka Khan on Tiny Desk (YouTube), what an inspiring performer, singing with strength, grace and style after many decades in the industry.

What's next for you?

I have just performed the role of Irene in Handel's Theodora for a concert performance with the Brighton Early Music Festival Community Choir. It's a return to performance after a ten-year break and I am excited by the prospect of more. I am also developing new courses through my company voiceyourpotential.com. I am currently editing acoustic, endoscopic and video data in preparation to present a pilot study carried out in partnership with my specialist speech and language therapy colleagues at Manchester Department of Speech, Voice & Swallowing Wythenshawe Hospital, Manchester NHS Trust. This will be presented at the Chichester Research Conference in September 2024.

Chichester Conservatoire graduate tours the UK with Wicked!

2019 BA (Hons) Musical Theatre Performance graduate, Adam Stickler, is currently performing in the 2023-25 UK & Ireland tour of Wicked as a Swing and understudy for The Wonderful Wizard of Oz/Dr Dillamond. The empowering tale of two remarkable women, Wicked is a stunning re-imagining of the beloved and world-renowned Wizard of Oz story by L. Frank Baum, which opened at The Gershwin Theatre on Broadway in 2003 before transferring to The Apollo Victoria, London in 2006. The smash-hit musical, based on Gregory Maguire's novel, has music and lyrics by Stephen Schwartz and book by Winnie Holzman has been seen by over 65 million people in more than 130 cities in 16 countries around the world!

Adam initially trained on BA (Hons) Music & Musical Theatre for his first year at the conservatoire, before switching over to the single honours programme, Musical Theatre Performance, when it was launched by programme leader Andrew Wright in September 2017. Whilst training, Adam took on lead roles in The Wedding Singer, Little Women, The Addams Family, Jekyll & Hyde and the world premieres of Notre Dame (Ed Court) and The Stationmaster (Tim Connor & Susannah Pearse). Upon graduation, Adam signed with Chris Davis Management LTD and has played various roles including Prince Charming in Cinderella at the Lowther Pavilion, Lytham St Anne's and John Carpenter in The Crooked Spire at The Chesterfield Theatres (Pomegranate).

Reflecting back on his time at Chichester,
Adam said that "Having had experience
of working on productions whist training,
I was able to adapt to many challenges
thrown my way. Studying a swing project
as my dissertation set me up really well as
I was prepared to become an actual
swing in a professional show. The module
required detailed note taking and working
with multiple tracks, so it was an
invaluable experience."



The casting process for the show is quite intense, Adam tells us "There were five rounds in total including a final that was filmed and sent to the American creatives. When I got the call to say I booked the job, I screamed! The lead up to rehearsals was super exciting and living in London and seeing Wicked posters everywhere just helped to hype me up even more. Touring is great, it's a nice way to see lots of different places and you end up creating a close-knit group with the rest of the cast/crew."

Adam goes on to say "My advice to students would be to just get stuck in with as much as possible whilst you're training. Sing in the choirs, do extra classes and audition for all the shows and showcases!"

The tour concludes in early 2025 at The Palace Theatre, Manchester and plays other venues in Southampton, Liverpool, Dublin, Sunderland and Cardiff. For more information, please visit wickedthemusical.co.uk/tour

MA Dance Science and Somatics student Ellen Dacombe teaches at Ceroc Pan Asia Championships: Bangkok Thailand, 22-26th May 2024

The Ceroc Pan Asia Championships (CPAC), having just completed its seventh year running, is renowned for being the most internationally attended Modern Jive event on the circuit. Dancers from around the globe come to participate in workshops led by accomplished teachers and to compete on a dance floor alongside a diverse array of dancers.

Ellen was invited to teach a workshop, titled "Pre-Comp Prep," at the event held in Bangkok, Thailand. It would be an hour-long session full of useful tips and techniques designed to get both the mind and body into competition mode. It combined traditional dance techniques to condition the body with somatic practices to stimulate creativity. Accepting and attending this event was made possible with funding from Lisa Ullmann Travelling Scholarship Fund (LUTSF).

Teaching at this event would give Ellen the opportunity to draw from experience as a competition dancer, judge, and teacher, as well as her current studies at the University of Chichester where she is completing her Masters Degree in Dance Science and Somatics. Over the years of teaching and dancing she has observed a growing desire for a more embodied approach to partner dancing, moving away from structured choreography to explore different movements and shapes within lead and follow, coupled with a true connection to the music.

Ellen curated the workshop to include various drills to enhance the connection between competition partners and explore these themes further. They began with solo warm-ups, drawing from ballet and contemporary dance to awaken the muscles and help dancers connect with their own sense of self. Partner dancers often lose their movement autonomy, especially followers who are trained to listen and respond to their leaders.

Next. Ellen asked followers to close their eyes and hold their palms up at waist level, while their partners placed their palms on top, facing down. The partners were responsible for inviting the followers to move through a subtle connection, starting with simple forward and back motions, and then exploring different levels. The leads were encouraged to consider how inviting the hand high, low, or in different directions could inform the followers' movements. They then switched roles so the leaders could experience being led. Some couples embraced the opportunity to explore beyond the confines of Modern Jive, while others needed more encouragement and permission.

The final drill was called 'You Go, I Go.' Modern Jive is a lead-and-follow dance, often dominated by the lead, which limits the followers' ability to contribute to the conversation of the dance. In this drill, they slowed down the interaction, allowing both lead and follow to take turns making moves. This concept reduces the need for the lead to constantly control the movement, opening a dialogue. It allows the follower to offer an invitation that the lead can use to inspire their next move. This more connected, embodied way of dancing can uncover many new moves that the couple might not have discovered organically, resulting in a more natural flow without relying on pre-learned steps.

One of Ellen's highlights from the weekend was then being able to demonstrate freestyle lead and follow incorporating the different techniques taught at the workshop in front of the attendees at the event. She was then invited to judge the various competition categories over the weekend and says that it was a joy to see so many dancers embody these learnings into their competition dancing and excel on the dance floor.

Ellen says "I truly believe that embodied practice and somatic work have a significant place in partner dance. I am deeply grateful to CPAC and LUTSF for providing me the opportunity to explore these concepts with an incredible group of dancers"

Marcia Bellamy

Our BMus Vocal Performance cohort attended Glyndebourne on 3rd June for the Pre-General Rehearsal of Franz Lehár's The Merry Widow. This was a chance to observe a world class opera company at work-in-progress on a major new production. They were greeted and given a special introduction by Artistic Director Stephen Langridge.

They attended as guests of Marcia Bellamy, Conservatoire tutor in Singing and German. Along with Professor Stephen Plaice of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, Marcia was commissioned to produce a new translation of The Merry Widow for the 2024 Glyndebourne Festival. Previously for Glyndebourne, Plaice & Bellamy had produced the one act operetta, Mesdames de la Halle by Offenbach, renamed In the Market for Love, a raucous, romp of a show especially for a socially distanced audience during the pandemic.

The Merry Widow was given a lavish production directed by comic genius Cal McCrystal, with sumptuous set and costumes by Gary McCann, starring Danielle Deniese, Germán Olvera, Sir Thomas Allen, and with John Wilson conducting the London Philharmonic Orchestra.

We love our weekly sing, and also enjoy performing- often concerts offer us opportunities to raise money for causes and charities close to our hearts.


Community Orchestra

Leader: John Hancorn




KEYBOARD GROUP

JAZZ THEORY

This is open to any student wanting to refine their understanding of how to analyse a jazz standard. We will be looking at the use of modes, scales, chord tones, harmonic sequences and chord construction. This will be primarily theory-based with some practical components where appropriate. Some basic understanding of music theory will be required.

JAZZ WORKSHOP

Students are assigned to groups based on experience/ability level. The jazz tutors then work with their group on several pieces during the afternoon, which are then usually showcased during Jazz Night. Any music student is welcome so long as they have a genuine interest in developing their jazz skills within a group setting. Any ability level is welcome, but commitment is expected throughout the semester, since spaces are limited.

JAZZ ENSEMBLE

Relaxed, creative and productive workshops where you're invited to choose pieces to be explored. The workshops offer harmonic and rhythmic ideas to use



as tools for improvisation. There is an emphasis on the fact that knowledge is only knowledge if it can be applied... hopefully you'll take plenty of ideas away that you can use and use effectively.

MUSICAL THEATRE WORKSHOPS

Providing a forum for trying out new songs or potential assessment material in the run up to assessments. The performance friendly atmosphere means that even the less confident amongst us will feel comfortable about getting up to sing. You'll be given lots of helpful hints and suggestions and the sessions are a great chance to air your songs in public and hear what other people are singing too.

ROCK / POP WORKSHOPS

These workshops will give you the opportunity to explore Rock and Pop specific techniques and areas of musicality in a very informal and vocational way. You'll collaborate

with your tutor to plan topics to cover each semester, and everyone works as a team to offer friendly feedback, ideas and support.

DRUMMERS' WORKSHOP

Open to all kit players, drummers' workshop is an opportunity to develop rhythmic, aural, reading, ensemble and improvisation skills in a fun and engaging environment.

ROCK WORKSHOP

Rock/Sight reading workshop is an opportunity for band musicians to come together and develop their own rock bands in a focused and purposeful way. Material covered is student led and can range from metal to prog-rock; whatever you are interested in and wish to explore.

Book Review #3

Patti Smith – Just Kids

Patti Smith's "Just Kids" is a time machine to when New York was the ultimate playground for starving artists and future legends. Smith takes us right into her world in exploring her relationship with artist and photographer Robert Mapplethorpe - two broke kids trying to make it big in the city. We're talking Chelsea Hotel vibes, rubbing elbows with rock stars, and finding inspiration in the chaos of 1970s NYC.

The best part? It's all real. Smith's writing feels like she's spilling secrets over latenight coffee at some underground cafe. She doesn't hold back on the struggles. the wild parties, or the raw energy of creating art when the whole world seems against you. It's not just about Smith and Mapplethorpe though.

This book is a love letter to a New York that doesn't exist anymore - a place where you could bump into Andy Warhol at a dive bar or trade poems with Allen Ginsberg in Washington Square Park. I loved the 'Allen Ginsberg sandwich moment' - Patti is poor and hungry and hanging out at the automat where you can buy cheap food from a vending machine the prices have gone up and she's 10 cents short of a cheese sandwich.

An older man starts chatting her up, thinking she's a cute boy (classic Patti androgyny). Turns out it's Allen Ginsberg...when he realizes she's a girl, he's like, "Oh, sorry. I thought you were a very pretty boy." But instead of being

weird about it, he buys her the sandwich anyway. It's this perfect little snapshot of kindness and the bizarre connections that could happen in '70s New York.

On her adventures around the city, Patti's collects random items she finds on the streets. We're not talking fancy antiques here - it's all about the overlooked treasures, the urban detritus that most people would walk right past. Old postcards, discarded knickknacks, forgotten books - anything that catches her eye becomes part of her personal museum. It's like she's curating the soul of New York, piece by piece.

Each object has a story, a history, and she's rescuing them from oblivion. It's not just hoarding; it's about finding beauty and inspiration in the castoffs of city life. But what I like about this aspect of her story is that when it's time to move on, she lets it all go. It's this beautiful, bittersweet moment.

She's not attached to the physical objects, but to the memories and inspiration they provided. Letting them go is like releasing a part of herself back into the city, allowing someone else to find and be inspired by them. It's a perfect metaphor for her time in New York - collecting experiences, friendships, and moments, then moving on to the next phase of life. It shows how she values the transient nature of things, the constant flow and change of the city and her own life.

by material possessions. This practice shapes her art, encouraging a perspective that values experiences over possessions and sees poetry in the mundane.

By collecting and then letting go, Smith embodies the transient nature of New York life, always open to new experiences while willing to move forward. It's a mindset that permeates her music, writing, and approach to life - constantly evolving, transforming the ordinary into art, and staying true to the ever-changing rhythm of the city she calls home.





BILLY TALENT - II

After you get used to the vocals (!) this album is catchy, shrieky, fast and massively enjoyable. Released in 2006 the album has since been certified four times platinum with an estimated 1.2 million in worldwide sales. Here, Billy Talent showed that a straight-up rock band — albeit one with a lingering punk ethos — could still be intelligent, creative and unique. The music and lyrical themes frequently complement each other.

'Red Flag' and 'Devil in a Midnight Mass' come off as well written, but still gritty punk songs. It's a relatively short 50minute album that works well, kind of whatever mood you're in (if you like chuggy fast guitars and screaming vocals). The band shows off some of it's more melodic side with songs such as 'Fallen Leaves', 'The Navy Song' and 'Surrender' which all work well and are memorable, easy to like and not too dated (for an album that is 18 years old). Give it a go, go on!
